1 THE COURT: Let's start with 2 3 plaintiffs. MR. SHANDLER: Your Honor, 4 5 for the plaintiffs, the AMD 6 plaintiffs, Chad Shandler from 7 Richards, Layton and Finger. And with me is Chuck Diamond from 8 9 O'Melveny and Myers. 10 MR. DIAMOND: Good morning, 11 Your Honor. 12 THE COURT: Good morning. 13 MR. HOLZMAN: For the class 14 plaintiffs, Your Honor, James Holzman with Prickett, Jones and 15 16 Elliott. And also on the phone 17 with me is my partner, Clay Athey. Also on the phone from Washington 18 is Dan Small of the Cohen Milstein 19 20 firm. 21 THE COURT: Good morning, 22 counsel. 23 MR. Horwitz: Good morning, 24 Your Honor, this is Rich Horwitz

from Potter Anderson for Intel, and with me on the line from Howrey in DC are Peter Moll and Darren Bernhard.

THE COURT: Good morning, all.

MR. HORWITZ: Your Honor, before we get started, I would just like to make clear that we were surprised and frankly disappointed to get the letter from Mr. Shandler a little before 11:00 last night that the parties have tried to work together on this protective order issue for months. And I hope that when we meet on Monday after the protective order hearing, as part of our discussion about setting up ground rules, we will set something up so that submissions like this will not come in at almost 11:00 at night with a 9:00 call scheduled for the next

morning.

We had an incident a week ago where letters were sent late, and the point last week was not that we did not understand AMD's position. The point last week was that agreement was reached that they would file a letter and we would respond to it. And that letter never came in until so late. That, just like now, it has really inhibited or prohibited our chance to respond to the Court.

THE COURT: It is more than inhibitive. I can tell you since I have been in my office since 8:20 this morning, I have not seen that letter. So I am inhibited because I'm not sure what we are talking about. And if the information contained in that letter is important for purposes of conducting the business I want to conduct today and that is

really to get some view as to how the hearing should proceed and what the parameters of it should be and what the template of it should look like, then I'm operating with two hands behind my back.

MR. HORWITZ: Well, Your

Honor, I think that you will hear

from AMD and the class plaintiffs

that is exactly what they sent to

you and to us for the first time

at 10:40 p.m. last night.

MR. DIAMOND: Your Honor, this is Chuck Diamond in Los Angeles. If I have offended my friends, Mr. Horwitz or Mr. Moll or Mr. Bernhard, that certainly wasn't our intent. What we did was just simply put together a list of the issues that are joined by the various objections and the responses. It is a list of I think 36 items that in one way or

another need to be disposed, and we thought it would be useful to you to have that on one piece of paper in front of you.

COURT: Counsel, if and I say this respectfully, anything that is going to be helpful to point me in the right direction and ultimately help me serve up to the court something that is going to assist the court in entering an order that is smart for everyone is certainly what looking for. But it is quite frankly not helpful if I don't know it is coming. And I don't know to sit down at a desk first thing in the morning and turn on a computer and look for it. I along with I think all of you have screens with anywhere from 150 to 200 mails on it each day. will have to figure out a much better way to serve up issues that

I'm responsible for dealing with and to make sure that everyone is informed before it becomes my responsibility to make a finding and recommendation.

MR. DIAMOND: I will not belabor it, I apologize to you and counsel for Intel getting this out so late.

MR. SHANDLER: I would second that, it wasn't our intention to pull a fast one on anybody. It just got a little later than we anticipated and we apologize for that.

MR. DIAMOND: The list simply tracks the 36 items that are discussed in the response to the third-party objections. And it was just as I said before, it was intended to put in front of everybody's face in a convenient form the outstanding issues that need to be resolved.

THE COURT: It seems to me in order to make my conversation with you productive, it is important that I have that in front of me and it is important that I have everyone's view, informed view with respect to So I reluctantly suggest that I think we are going to have to reconvene sometime mid afternoon today. But we have -have some logistic issues, logistical issues to deal with because I have some things on the calendar as well. I will need to put you on hold for approximately five minutes so I can figure out what we need to do here.

MR. HORWITZ: Your Honor, before going on hold, there are a few issues which I think it would be helpful to discuss now because if we wait until later in the day, because of the nature of the

issues, I think it may be too late. And they relate to a request that came in from one of the third parties to be able to participate by telephone I think was Mr. Kelly who sent in a letter earlier this week to Your Honor, and I know that there were some questions about that courtroom because you raised that with us last week. But I think that they are probably waiting to hear, and if people have to make travel arrangements for third parties, I don't know whether they can make them. Or at least if there's going to be a phone option, people should know today. Wait until the end of the day, I think that's going to make things even more hectic and disruptive on Monday morning.

THE COURT: Mr. Horwitz, here is what I did with respect to

that. When I got the letter, I contacted the courthouse and talked to Judge Farnan's case manager. Two things have occurred. No. 1, Judge Farnan given the expectation that there may be more of you than fewer of you, has offered the use of his courtroom. That is courtroom 4B -- 4B. Is it 4B?

MR. HORWITZ: Yes.

THE COURT: And I would have been advising you of that either later in this conversation or later today once I firmed up detail. But in any event, it is going to be in his courtroom. I have been advised that with respect to even his courtroom, that it is inadequate to provide telephone access because the persons on the other end of the phone really can't hear what's going on in the courtroom. And

with that information I thought it was completely appropriate because it dealt with an administrative matter to advise Mr. Kelly by telephone ex parte that a telephone conference was -- telephone conferencing was not going to be available. So he is aware of that. I am not aware of any other request to participate by telephone. If I missed something, please tell me.

MR. HORWITZ: Your Honor,
this is Rich Horwitz. I have not
seen anything else on the record,
although I think that letter even
though I don't have it in front of
me says that there may be
out-of-town counsel and as I read
it, I thought it might have been
plural, but he was speaking for
the group. Now, maybe he has
communicated that to others if
there were others. I don't know.

Just

He was, as THE COURT: 1 understand it, speaking for the 2 group, and based on what I 3 understood to be our conversation 4 yesterday, he would be informing 5 them that teleconferencing was not 6 7 possible. And it may be something we may want to figure out for the 8 future. Expecting we are going to 9 10 be doing a little bit of business 11 in the courthouse, it may be 12 something I need to talk to Judge 13 Farnan to see if a line can't be 14 or equipment can't be installed to 15 accommodate teleconferencing. 16 MR. HORWITZ: Okay. 17 THE COURT: Mr. Horwitz, any other matters that we should 18 19 address now before putting you on 20 hold? Any other counsel, please? 21 MR. HORWITZ: I think that 22 it for me, Your Honor. This is 23 Rich Horwitz again. Thank you. 24 THE COURT:

1 hold for a moment, please. (Recess at 9:18 a.m.) 2 (Resumed at 9:20 a.m.) 3 THE COURT: Counsel, I'm 4 back on again. Let's do this, 5 6 just for purposes of discussing 7 the nature of the hearing and 8 getting your input as to how you 9 see that that should develop, I'm 10 not sure I need the correspondence 11 to do that. If after we have that 12 conversation, if those of you that 13 have just received that 14 correspondence believe it is 15 important for me to reconvene sometime during the course of the 16 17 afternoon, I can accommodate that 18 after 3:00. Let's -- with that in 19 mind, let me just try and see if I can't get some assist from you in 20 21 terms of what the hearing should 22 look like. 23 And let me start by saying I 24 think my purpose and Judge

1

Farnan's purpose in wanting me to conduct a hearing in advance of ultimately submitting something that hopefully is developed by stipulation of everyone involved is to gain a better understanding of what the third parties' concerns are, and what your positions are with respect to those. And I know you have done that, I know you have spent a significant amount of time in negotiating what you provided to the third parties, and I know you have been drilling down through their positions. And I have read all of the dockets, all of docket entries that were identified in Mr. Cottrell's letter to me dated June 2.

It seems to me that the best way to approach this is perhaps to take the template that the AMD response to their objections, to

use AMD's response, the format of it, that is, as the template to literally march through the entire proposed protective order. Permit you as leads to act as leads of the hearing. Walk through each the provisions of the proposed protective that are at issue if you will, where there are some objections, permit those third parties that are present to add or provide, shed some light on their written words, and then permit you all to respond to those so that we are literally marching through the protective order certainly not word by word although there are some words that are, quote, unquote, at issue. But section by section so that we can move through it and star each element where there is no dispute so that it is expected to become part of the order as it moves forward to

....

Judge Farnan, listen to the respective sides and if a judgment needs to be made on my part or recommendation, make that recommendation then and there, so everyone has an expectation at the end of the hearing that we have a stipulation by all concerned or we have a stipulation in the major parts and those items that are disputed, I will serve up a recommendation from me.

MR. MOLL: This is Peter

Moll. We certainly agree with
that approach. We think the

primary purpose here is to let the
third parties have their say and
that was one of the concerns we
had about the letter that we got.

I didn't get until this morning,
that there was an effort to say

maybe all of the third parties
shouldn't be heard from on all of
the things, and we think it is

important that they are heard, make a record if they are coming all that way. And we think that the approach Your Honor suggested is fine and perfectly acceptable to us.

MR. DIAMOND: I think that makes a great deal of sense. You may want to consider doing one thing sort of preliminarily.

THE COURT: Please.

MR. DIAMOND: When you have a chance to take a look at just the list that we put together, you will see that Mr. Moll and I and class counsel were able to negotiate out additional revised language to accommodate I would say about two-thirds of the objections. And I have a feeling that although the responses and objections tee up 36 separate issues, probably two dozen of those are resolved by the language

that we voluntarily agreed to.

So you may want to take a first pass at the issue list. You may want to consider actually distributing that to the third parties and narrowing the field, because I think what you will find is that there are really only disputes over a relatively small number of provisions now, probably fewer than 10. But that is just simply a matter of time management.

MR. MOLL: This is Peter

Moll. What I would suggest,

Chuck, is simply say to the third

parties as to this particular

provision, whether also

Paragraph 1, whatever it is, we

have made an accomodation and we

hope everybody is satisfied with

it, and make sure that no one has

a problem with the accommodation

we reached, and then hopefully we

can move on very quickly.

THE COURT: And perhaps that distribution if I could rely on your courtesies to get that done, it may make better sense because you have been doing this rather routinely with them, that you do And have copies of -- I don't know whether the document I'm going to be seeing has -- I expect it is going to have all of the language that you are proposing and have enough copies of that language available even at the hearing for those third parties that for some reason or not don't get to view what you distribute. Does that make sense?

MR. DIAMOND: The language is set forth in the response that we did. The language was to set forth each paragraph, the objection, our response and any negotiated modification to the

language that we proposed. third parties already have that, we served the response on them. This schedule is just that, it is just a list of 36 issues and indicates as to each where we have proposed additional language, it doesn't quote it. But I think what we could do is just circulate the list and another copy of the response by e-mail which is the way we have been communicating with all of these folks. So long I have Peter and Darren sign off on the schedule that we prepared. And we can work that out.

THE COURT: Mr. Diamond, thank you.

MR. MOLL: This is Peter

Moll. This is key and it cross

references to plaintiff's filing,

it should also be for everybody's

convenience cross referenced to

1 what we filed and hopefully we can work that out with Mr. Diamond. 2 Because we haven't had a chance to 3 study this list, as I said, Your Honor, it came in at 11 last 6 night. I haven't seen it until this morning. So we will try to 7 work that out with Mr. Diamond. 8 That is fine. 9 MR. DIAMOND: We can do that. 10 11 MR. SMALL: This is Dan 12 Small for the class plaintiffs. 13 wanted Your Honor to know that we 14 are on board for the approach that 15 you suggested for the hearing on 16 Monday. 17 THE COURT: Okay. 18 MR. DIAMOND: This is 19 Mr. Diamond. The only other suggestion I made, and if Intel is 20 21 uncomfortable with it, then obviously we will withdraw it. 22 23 But I have had the pleasure of 24 spending the last eight months or

so individually negotiating with all of these parties plus 11 others. And, Judge, you may be in for a long day on Monday.

THE COURT: We anticipated that that might be the case. And I would like some sense just so we know, some sense as to how long you think that may be.

MR. DIAMOND: What we have attempted in -- to the best of our ability to short circuit it to agree as to changes wherever we thought we could reasonably do that. But I still think that if we march through 36 issues, you will probably find one of the 20 who is prepared to speak to each. So I assume this is going to be a day-long affair.

But the only other suggestion you might want to make, we took a look at these and thought that they really broke

1 into three categories. There a bunch of issues as to what 2 material ought to be deemed 3 confidential. There is a bunch of materials as to how confidential 5 6 and non confidential material can be used. 7 THE COURT: Right. 8 9 MR. DIAMOND: And there is a 10 third bucket which concerns 11 limitations on attorneys and 12 experts who get access to confidential information. 13 14 THE COURT: Yes. 15 MR. DIAMOND: And all 36 16 fall within one of those 17 three buckets. We suggested to you and 18 19 something you might want to consider, and that is to have the 20 21 third parties appoint a 22 spokesperson for each issue or 23 each bucket of issues so that you 24 don't have to listen to the same

arguments 20 times. Most of the third parties have been cooperating as a part of one group or another. There is a distributors group, there is the Japanese OEM group, and they have been talking among themselves. So it is certainly conceivable that they could get themselves organized and streamline this if you ask them to do that.

this, Mr. Diamond. I think that is an excellent suggestion and one that if you have been having -- you have been having routine contact with them, is it fair to ask you to help facilitate that, even in advance of Monday? If you've got contact with someone that is the likely lead on any one of these issues for the respective third parties, is it fair to ask you to try to marshal that between

now and Monday? Otherwise what we will be doing is the first thing to open up the hearing on Monday, it would be my effort to try and just drill through and find those spokespersons for the three categories that you mention. And we may be using valuable time that you may be able to assist in taking a chunk out of today or even sometime over the weekend.

MR. MOLL: Your Honor, this is Peter Moll for Intel. We have also talked with a number of these third parties. And some of the third parties, particularly some of the smaller distributors have sort of banded together and have hired a single counsel to represent them.

THE COURT: Okay.

MR. MOLL: And we anticipate that that counsel will be speaking on their behalf. But some of the

third parties, for example, OEMs, 1 2 Bell, Hewlett Packard, IBM, 3 Lenolo, these are major companies that are represented by their own 4 5 counsel. And are competitors of one another and have their own 6 7 perspective. So those people feel since they filed papers, I think 8 9 they should have the opportunity 10 to be heard. But I think what 11 might be productive here is if at 12 the very beginning of the hearing 13 or if we could do it beforehand, 14 we would be happy to work with Mr. 15 Diamond on this, to get for Your 16 Honor a list, and maybe we could 17 start the hearing just trying to get a list even before Your Honor 18 19 begins of who's there and who they 20 are representing. So that we take 21 that sort of administrative burden 22 off Your Honor's shoulder and have 23 something to present to Your 24 Honor.

THE COURT: That would be a good idea. Effectively a sign-in list that may be more sophisticated than that. So what I think I'm hearing, if you can't because you have other important work to be doing for purposes of Monday's hearing, if you can't get the administrative outline in order between now and Monday, use the first hour's worth of time to permit you in the courtroom outside of my presence to kind of gather the administrative pieces together.

MR. DIAMOND: We are going to ask each party to sign in and to identify which of the 36 issues they still believe there is a need for them to address.

MR. MOLL: My thought was more along the lines of we get the third parties and we know that so and so is here from this law firm and what they want to do is they want -- they are going to speak on behalf of the following. If you want to try to get a list of what paragraph they want to address, we could try to do that, too. But I think we simply suggest to them that they get their -- when they come, we, -- you know, we just get this administrative procedure. am happy to work with you on a letter to send out, but again we don't want to be sending this

letter out to these people at 5:00 or 6:00 this evening either.

THE COURT: No, I certainly agree with that. It would be helpful to have a letter out, but a letter out at 5:00 may miss a number of people, particularly a Friday. And I guess one of the things that you are saying that by virtue of doing this, we would be in a position once the hearing starts to review language for those issues and objections which you think the parties have already accommodated so that we can sweep those off the table as quickly as possible.

MR. MOLL: Yes, Your Honor, and then Your Honor could simply say as to Paragraph 2, I understand there is no objection, everybody is in agreement, and then you could move on. And you could have it right on the record

that everybody is accommodated.

We could move through very

quickly.

THE COURT: That would be great, and outline from you to the extent that you can identify the areas of commonality and the areas of dispute, that would be extraordinarily helpful.

MR. DIAMOND: I think the way to start is to get this list and if necessary another copy of the responses out on e-mail this morning. And Peter, I think it should go out with a cover letter sent on behalf of all of us. I would be happy to have you draft the language, just to inform people how we anticipate this procedure to work. And as people come prepared to identify which of the topics they still think there is a need to address. And then you and I and Mr. Moll can elicit

responses at 10:00 and figure out what really needs to be argued.

MR. MOLL: And prepare a master list for His Honor that we can all walk through.

THE COURT: That is perfect.

MR. DIAMOND: Yeah.

THE COURT: And of course it goes without saying that the overall goal if we can at the end of this hearing be in a position to submit something that is jointly submitted and final, that would be wonderful. If not, we will do what we need to do because I think it is important for me to get it finalized by June 15.

So it was fair.

MR. DIAMOND: Peter, if you would draft something out, draft something up, I will obviously be in the office in a couple of hours and turn that around immediately. And I would ask Dan Small to do the same on behalf of the class.

If we can get something on the wire before noon today California time, that will catch everybody.

MR. MOLL: Might even try to do it be a little more ambitious than that because that is 3 our time. Again it is a Friday, and just so people have plenty of time so we have the best chance of it going as smoothly and efficiently as possible.
